Executive Summary of Citizen Survey Results

Overview and Methodology

The Park District of Highland Park conducted a Community Attitude and Interest Survey during the fall of 2009. The purpose of the survey was to help identify needs and improvements regarding Park District parks, facilities, programs and services and to assist the Park District in planning for and prioritizing future projects. The survey was designed to obtain statistically valid results from households throughout the Park District of Highland Park. The survey was administered by a combination of mail and phone.

Leisure Vision worked extensively with Park District of Highland Park officials in the development of the survey questionnaire. This work allowed the survey to be tailored to issues of strategic importance to effectively plan the future system.

Leisure Vision mailed surveys to a random sample of 4,000 households throughout the Park District. Approximately three days after the surveys were mailed each household that received a survey also received an electronic voice message encouraging them to complete the survey. In addition, about two weeks after the surveys were mailed Leisure Vision began contacting households by phone. Those who indicated they had <u>not</u> returned the survey were given the option of completing it by phone.

The goal was to obtain a total of at least 800 completed surveys from Park District of Highland Park households. This goal was accomplished, with a total of 853 surveys having been completed. The results of the random sample of 853 households have a 95% level of confidence with a precision of at least $\pm -3.4\%$.

The following pages summarize major survey findings:

Major Survey Findings

- Visitation of Park District Parks. Ninety-three percent (93%) of households have visited Park District of Highland Park parks during the past 12 months. This is significantly higher than the national average of 72%, and the Illinois average of 78%. Of the 93% of households that have used Park District parks during the past 12 months, 95% rated the parks as either excellent or good. This is significantly higher than the national average of 85%, and higher than the Illinois average of 89%.
- ▶ <u>Use of Various Park District Parks and Recreation Facilities.</u> Seventy percent (70%) of households have used Sunset Woods Park during the past 12 months, and 66% have used the Recreation Center of Highland Park. The other Park District parks and recreation facilities used most frequently during the past 12 months are: Hidden Creek AquaPark (50%), Heller Nature Center (46%), and Larry Fink Memorial Park (45%).
- Need for Parks and Recreation Facilities. The parks and recreation facilities that the highest percentage of households have a need for are: walking and biking trails (80%), lakefront parks (77%), small neighborhood parks (73%), nature center and trails (64%), indoor fitness and exercise facilities (58%), indoor running/walking track (58%), and outdoor swimming pools/water parks (55%).
- ➤ <u>Most Important Parks and Recreation Facilities.</u> Based on the sum of their top four choices, the parks and recreation facilities that households rated as the most important are: walking and biking trails (45%), lakefront parks (35%), small neighborhood parks (28%), indoor fitness and exercise facilities (25%), and nature center and trails (20%).
- Participation in Park District Recreation and Sports Programs. Forty-nine percent (49%) of households have participated in Park District of Highland Park recreation or sports programs during the past 12 months. This is significantly higher than the national average of 30%, and higher than the Illinois average of 38%. Of the 49% of households that have participated in Park District of Highland Park recreation or sports programs during the past 12 months, 93% rated the overall quality of the recreation programs as either excellent or good, and 87% rated the overall quality of the sports programs as either excellent or good.
- ➤ Ways Households Learn About Park District Programs and Activities. The Park District program guide (82%) is by a wide margin the most frequently mentioned way respondents learn about Park District of Highland Park programs and activities. The other most frequently mentioned ways respondents learn about Park District programs and activities are: friends and neighbors (40%), Park District website (38%), and Park District print newsletters (37%).

- Programizations Used for Indoor and Outdoor Recreation and Sports Activities. The organizations used by the highest percentage of households for indoor and outdoor recreation and sports activities during the past 12 months are: the Park District of Highland Park (71%), school facilities (40%), Lake County Forest Preserve District (38%), neighboring communities (28%), and private clubs (27%).
- ➤ <u>Use of Lakefront Parks and Facilities.</u> Sixty-one percent (61%) of households have used Rosewood Park and Beach during the past 12 months, and 50% have used Central Park/Park Ave. Beach during the past 12 months.
- Need for Recreation Programs. The recreation programs that the highest percentage of households have a need for are: adult fitness and wellness programs (55%), special events (42%), nature programs/environmental education (36%), and youth sports programs (33%).
- Most Important Recreation Programs. Based on the sum of their top four choices, the recreation programs that households rated as the most important are: adult fitness and wellness programs (40%), youth sports programs (21%), youth summer camp programs (18%), and special events (17%).
- Recreation Programs Participated in Most Often at Park District Facilities. Based on the sum of their top four choices, the recreation programs that households have participated in most often at Park District facilities are: adult fitness and wellness programs (25%), youth sports programs (19%), youth summer camp programs (13%), and special events (11%).
- ➤ Golf Course Use. Twenty-nine percent (29%) of households have played at the Sunset Valley Golf Course during the past 12 months, and 25% have played at the Highland Park County Club Golf Course during the past 12 months.
 - Forty-one percent (41%) of households think the community needs two golf courses, 43% do not think the community needs two golf courses, and the remaining 16% of households did not provide a response.
- ➤ Items to Develop at a Converted Golf Course. Based on the sum of their top four choices, the items that households would most support being developed at a converted golf course are: walking/biking trails (53%), natural areas for passive use (32%), and upgraded and enhanced indoor fitness facilities (32%).
- Potential Improvements to Park District Lakefront Parks. Based on the sum of their top three choices, the improvements that households feel are most important to make to lakefront parks are: restrooms (55%), swimming beach areas (54%), walking trails (42%), and bluff, ravine and shoreline restoration (39%).

- Most Important Actions to Improve the Parks and Recreation System. Based on the sum of their top four choices, the actions that households are most supportive of the Park District of Highland Park taking to improve the parks and recreation system are: improve the lakefront (53%), upgrade and enhance existing walking and biking trails (46%), upgrade and enhance existing neighborhood parks (35%), and connect the Skokie Valley Bike Path with the Heller Nature Center grounds (32%).
- Paying Additional Taxes to Fund Construction and Development of New and Current Facilities. Thirty-seven percent (37%) of households would pay a tax increase of at least \$40 per year for bonds to pay for major construction and development costs of current and/or new facilities. It should also be noted that 65% of households would pay some amount of annual tax increase for bonds to pay for major construction and development costs of current and/or new facilities.
- Reasons Preventing the Use of Park District Parks, Facilities or Programs More Often. The most frequently mentioned reasons preventing households from using Park District parks, recreation and sports facilities or programs more often are: program times are not convenient (28%), fees are too high (27%), and program or facility not offered (18%).
- Level of Satisfaction with the Overall Value of the Park District. Seventy-seven percent (77%) of respondents are either very satisfied or somewhat satisfied with the overall value their household receives from the Park District of Highland Park, compared to only 7% who are either very dissatisfied or somewhat dissatisfied. In addition, 11% of respondents indicated "neutral" and 5% indicated "don't know".






Have you or a member of your household participated in any competitive sports programs offered by the Park District of Highland Park during the past 12 months?




How would you rate the overall quality of the program?



Have you or a member of your household participated in any recreational programs offered by the Park District of Highland Park during the past 12 months?










Age range of survey respondents




Age range of additional household members




Household income



Gender of survey respondent





Park District of Highland Park Environmental Policy - DRAFT

Statement of Philosophy: It is the intent of the District to assume a leadership role in establishing and following policies and practices within the District and throughout our community that promote a healthy environment and enhance our quality of life. The District will endeavor to:

- 1. Design, develop and maintain parks and facilities in a manner that enhances and protects the environment, wildlife and human health through the wise use of resources; minimizing impact on soil, air and water quality; reducing waste; limiting use of hazardous substances and serving to inform the community about sound environmental practices.
- 2. Promote the acquisition, protection and preservation of open space, habitat and local watersheds. Protect, enhance and interpret the historic and natural resources of the District.
- 3. Encourage purchasing practices and habits of use that emphasize renewable resources, explore alternative sources of energy and focus on the reduction of waste and also water and energy use.
- 4. Function as a role model within the community through individual and organizational action as well as public education.
- 5. Continually assess the impact of our operations on the environment in order to make improvements. Stay abreast of new technologies that advance leadership in environmental stewardship.

Environmental Principles: The following four principles will guide our practices and decisions as we continue to develop environmental action plans.

- Reduce Waste such as paper and plastic trash; construction debris; and food and yard waste, through implementation of the three R's: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle throughout our parks, facilities and programs.
- Use Resources Wisely through conservation of natural and manmade resources such as soil, water, electricity, fossil fuels and the materials produced from them.
- **Protect the Earth** by minimizing use of toxic and/or hazardous substances and maximizing efforts to make a healthier world for people, plants and animals.
- Share What We Know by building and maintaining partnerships with a broad range of public and private agencies; educating and informing our staff, patrons and community at large; using new technologies that allow us to work together more efficiently; and staying current on developments in environmental practice.

Environmental Practices: The District will employ the following practices in support of our environmental principles.

- ☐ Reduce Waste: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle
 - 1. Considering durability and impact in addition to price when selecting products.
 - 2. Purchasing recycled products with the maximum amount of post consumer recycled material practicable
 - 3. Providing collection bins for plastic, glass, and aluminum in conjunction with waste containers at all parks and facilities.
 - 4. Eliminating the use of single use products such as Styrofoam cups, paper plates, plastic cutlery, and bottled water whenever possible.
 - 5. Ensuring that all printing uses recycled paper identified as such.
 - 6. Minimizing copying by conveying documents digitally, if possible. Using both sides of paper sheets whenever practicable.
 - 7. Providing collection bins for paper in all offices.
 - 8. Composting all leaves, grass and other landscape materials.
 - 9. Recycling of trees and branches as wood chips and firewood.
 - 10. Recycling used motor oil.
 - 11. Recycling batteries, cellular telephones, printer cartridges and electronic equipment that cannot be resold as surplus.
 - 12. Donating unclaimed lost and found, surplus sports equipment, surplus District clothing and similar items to charitable organizations for reuse.

☐ Use Resources Wisely: Conserve Soil, Water, Energy and Materials

- 1. Installing energy saving and resource conserving devices, such as occupancy sensors and low flow water fixtures in all facilities.
- 2. Using the most energy efficient equipment (e.g. vehicles, HVAC equipment, appliances) that meet requirements and are competitively priced when lifespan operating and maintenance costs are taken into consideration.
- 3. Monitoring and limiting irrigation to avoid wasteful use of water.
- 4. Conserving energy and reducing harmful emissions by prohibiting unnecessary idling of vehicles on District property and by District personnel while on duty.
- 5. Employing best management practices to prevent erosion and excess stormwater runoff on District and neighboring properties.
- 6. Conserving electricity by installing energy saving lighting and turning off lights and equipment when not in use.
- 7. Incorporating green building technologies in new construction or renovations and striving for LEED building certifications.

□ Protect the Earth: Minimize Toxic/Hazardous Substances and Protect Natural Communities

- 1. Practice integrated pest management which eliminates or reduces the District's dependence on pesticides.
- 2. Favor native plantings in park landscape designs. Minimize management intensive landscapes (e.g. turf grass), where possible.
- 3. Promote the acquisition, protection, ecological restoration and environmentally sensitive management of open space, important watershed areas and natural habitats.
- 4. Use products for finishing, furnishing, maintenance and cleaning that are effective and that have the minimum toxic content and chemical hazard potential.
- 5. Participate in the "Partners for Clean Air" program following all guidelines on designated ozone action days.
- 6. Comply with the "Smoke Free Illinois Act" prohibiting smoking in a public place or place of employment or within 15 feet of an entrance to a public place or place of employment, unless exempted by the Act. No person may smoke in any vehicle owned, leased, or operated by the state or a political subdivision of the state.

☐ Share What We Know: Stay Current, Build Partnerships, Educate/Inform, Use New Technologies

- 1. The District will share information and practices with other organizations and agencies through partnerships, presentations at conferences, publications, etc.
- 2. The District will provide guidance to vendors and contractors to assist them in complying with this policy.
- 3. The District will encourage other park districts and affiliated agencies to adopt similar policies and become responsible environmental citizens.
- 4. The District will participate in community environmental initiatives by representation on the City of Highland Park Natural Resources Commission and related activities.
- 5. The District will cooperate with local School Districts 112 and 113 and other community organizations in advancing environmental projects.
- 6. Responsible environmental behavior will be expected of staff and encouraged in patrons.
- 7. Environmental programming will be offered by the Heller Nature Center and through the District's Natural Areas Volunteer program.

Other Actions: The District will set forth and maintain a program of objectives and action steps to support these principles and practices. The District will incorporate positive environmental components in other policies and procedures as appropriate.

- 1. This Environmental Policy will be attached to all bidding documents for all contractors and commercial users engaged in business with the District and they will be required to comply with this policy.
- 2. The District's purchasing practices will favor environmentally preferable products. Environmentally preferable products are those that have a lesser or reduced effect on human health and the environment when compared with competing products that serve the same purpose. This comparison may consider raw material acquisition, production, manufacturing, packaging, distribution, reuse, operation, maintenance or disposal of the product.
- 3. District funds will be placed in environmental responsible investments where returns equivalent to less responsible investments are expected.
- 4. An annual report of the District's environment impact and adherence to this policy shall be prepared and presented to the Park Board, staff and community.

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




